# **Fall Vaccine Clinics:**

Fall is just around the corner (even though that is a bit hard to imagine here lately with the intense heat we have been dealing with) and that means fall vaccine clinics are nearing. The clinics are days we provide routine healthcare for your horses, and the farm call is greatly reduced. Vaccines, de-worming, sheath cleaning and dental exams will be offered following a mandatory physical exam. Separate dates will be scheduled as necessary for dentistry. We ask that you call our office to reserve an appointment for the day(s) listed when we are in your area. We will call you back a few days before your reserved appointment to give you an estimated time when we will be at your address. Please keep in mind that occasionally emergencies occur making it necessary to reschedule your appointment. We do appreciate your patience when this happens. In order to help us stay on our schedule, we ask that you have your horses caught, haltered and ready for our visit. Please remember that we have many horses to treat in a day and are often unable to satisfy requests for specific appointment times or diagnosis/treat other issues in depth. ▶

### New Innovations in Equine Lameness: VET-STEM



Vet-Stem, Inc. is a company with 20 years of experience in regenerative medicine for the veterinary profession. Their modality is used to treat injured tendons, ligaments and joints. The process involves harvesting adipose (fat) tissue from your horse, shipping the sample to

Vet-Stem for isolation of your horse's own stem cells and regenerative cells which are in turn sent back to us to be injected in to the lesion or joint. This technology allows the injured cells to be replaced by normal functioning cells rather than scar tissue. For more information please visit their website at www.vet-stem.com.

### I.R.A.P. (Orthokine)

IRAP is another new and exciting treatment for osteoarthritis in the horse. IRAP is an acronym for interleukin 1 receptor antagonist protein and is also known as Orthokine. This molecule is a naturally occurring substance that down regulates (inhibits) the production of inflammatory chemicals responsible for cartilage damage in the joint. It involves a sample of blood drawn from your horse in a special syringe which is sent off to a laboratory for centrifugation and culture. This then concentrated product is sent back to us to inject into the joint. The product can also be frozen for future use. The typical protocol is a weekly injection for 3 treatments.
