#### Did You Know? A Few Surprising Facts about Horses

*Horses have a unique digestive system* | Their stomach is relatively small for their size and so horses rely on grazing throughout the day to get the nutrition they need. Horses can be prone to digestive disorders such as colic and diarrhea if their diet is not properly balanced or if they are not allowed to graze for long periods.

*Horses have excellent memories* | They are able to remember people, places, and other horses that they have met even years before!

**Horses have almost 360 degree field of view** | Horses have an average eye diameter of around 2 inches (5 cm)! This large size helps them to see well in low-light conditions and detect predators from a distance. Because of their size and how their eyes are set, horses have nearly a 360 degree field of view.

Horses have excellent hearing | Horses have the ability to rotate their ears 180 degrees to detect sounds in different directions. They are capable of hearing sounds at much higher frequencies than humans. If you give their feed bucket a little rattle, they'll come quickly running from the very far side of the paddock!

#### **How Often Do I Need to Deworm My Horse?**

**Ready for a shock? You are probably deworming your horse way too often!** Sure, the cost of a tube of dewormer may barely get you a Venti Starbucks coffee, BUT there are many benefits to judicious deworming beyond just saving on the cost and hassle.

To put it into perspective, we first have to consider the goal of deworming. The primary goal is to prevent the horse from developing disease due to parasites. It should be noted that a horse will never be completely free of internal parasites even directly after deworming, and that is OKAY! The other goal of deworming is to minimize the development of parasite resistance.

The American Association of Equine Practitioners (AAEP) recommends deworming mature horses one to two times per year with a macrocyclic lactone (such as ivermectin or moxidectin) and at least once per year with Praziquantel (a dewormer that targets tapeworms that is often found in combination with ivermectin or moxidectin dewormers.) Together, these recommendations mean that many healthy adult horses may only need to be dewormed once a year!

Some horses need more frequent deworming. Young horses (<5 years old) typically require a much more intensive deworming regimen. Older horses, especially those with Cushing's or other immune-related diseases, may also require additional dewormings.

Clinical signs that a horse has a parasitic infection include weight loss, dull hair coat, and a pot bellied appearance. A fecal egg count (FEC) is a good way to determine the parasite burden of your horse and their "shedding status." Horses that shed more than 500 eggs per gram of feces are considered "high shedders" and should receive additional deworming treatments even if they are not exhibiting any clinical signs of a higher worm burden. "High shedders" are targeted for deworming primarily to help decrease the amount of parasite eggs shed into the environment and to consequently aid in decreasing infection of other horses in the herd. Fecal reduction tests are fecal egg counts performed before and after deworming. These help determine if a dewormer is effective or if there are resistant parasites.

Based on this information, these are the common deworming practices to ditch.


• Contrary to what was recommended in the past, switching dewormers constantly is NOT recommended. This practice could actually lead to the development of more parasite resistance. Instead, dewormers should be selected based on the parasites present and what is expected to work best in the population.



Blindly deworming at fixed intervals should be avoided.
 The peak parasite transmission season (the ideal time to deworm) can change based on weather and other variables.

Deworming in horses is an evolving topic, and the recommendations frequently change. These recommendations are based on the deworming products available and the frequency of clinical disease seen in specific regions of the country.

If you are on the fence between buying yourself that Monday morning Venti Starbucks drink or buying a tube of dewormer for your healthy, adult horse, my recommendation would be to go for the coffee and talk to your veterinarian!
